One example comes from the writings of Howard Thurman. I offer his meditation as a guide for your reflection and empowerment.

I recognize the tendency to do the unkind thing when the mood of retaliation or revenge rides high in my spirit;

I recognize the tendency to make of others a means to my own ends;

I recognize the tendency to yield to fear and cowardice when fearlessness and courage seem to fit easily into the pattern of my security.

I seek the strength to overcome the tendency to evil in my own heart.

I seek the strength to overcome the evil that is present all about me.

I recognize the evil in much of the organized life about me;

I recognize the evil in the will to power as found in groups, institutions and individuals;

I recognize the terrible havoc of hate and bitterness which makes for fear and panic in the common life.

I seek the strength to overcome evil that is present all about me.

I seek the strength to overcome evil; I must not be overcome by evil.

I seek the purification of my own heart, the purging of my own motives;

I seek the strength to withstand the logic of bitterness, the terrible divisiveness of hate, the demonic triumph of the conquest of others.

What I seek for myself I desire with all my heart for friend and foe alike

I seek the strength to overcome evil.

EYE GLASS COLLECTION

The Lions Clubs collect used eveglasses and deliver them to regional Recycling Centers where they are cleaned, sorted by prescription strength and packaged. Most are distributed to people in need in developing countries where they will have the greatest impact. The Lions Clubs accept prescription and reading glasses, sunglasses and plastic and metal frames. Children's glasses are especially needed. For your convenience, there is a drop box located in the church office.





In youth group we have been going through a sermon series called, "Jesus is _____." I write this prompt on our chalkboard downstairs (If you haven't seen the changes we've been making in the room, feel free to check it out!) and I fill in the blanks each meeting with a different attribute of Jesus. This past week we discussed, "Jesus is <u>the answer to our questions."</u>

Each of the students were asked to write any questions they have on note cards. This could be anything that needs clarity in concern to their faith. I wanted them to be very vulnerable and no question was off limits. The questions I got were incredible, they put a lot of thought into them and I could tell they were really reaching for truth.

I think putting the pieces together as a teenager, even in my experience, comes from being real with where you are and determining how much you are really willing to commit to this faith journey. You are more likely to prioritize your faith if things are making sense, you are sensing God's presence and faithfulness in your life, etc. This is why asking questions is important. Our questions get answered over time but they likely develop. After growing up in different youth ministries, studying the Bible at two VERY different universities, I still have questions. But I know Jesus is the answer. I guide our students into believing that. I have studied and went over their questions to have some answers for when we meet again, and even the ones I am not as confident in, I am always trusting God to be close to them and remind His promises. This is Holy work. I am so blessed to be a part of it and I am glad to be able to partner with you all in ministering to our young people.

NANCY KLINE For me the "good old days" were growing up in Ferguson, MO helping my dad build our house on a wooded lot. We finished the project just as dad was transferred to Pittsburgh. We bought an "already built" house in Churchill where the neighborhood kids attended Wilkinsburg High School. WHS was a AAAA school. Football ruled. Go Tigers!

On graduation day I stood with the college of education with a major in human development (alias home economics). The year I graduated school districts came to Penn State looking for teachers. 
